Much more can and needs to be done to harness the data required to ensure programs, policies and services effectively respond to the specific needs of girls. When we invest in girls' health, safety, edu-

I attended a workshop called "Forced displacements: a feminist analysis of its causes" by CEAR (Committee for refugees). I attended this workshop because it seems to be that this topic has disappeared from our daily newspapers, chats...

The people gathered there were women from different lay institutions working or concerned about refugees. First of all, I discovered my ignorance confusing emigrant and refugee.

We consider 'refugees' those people that have been obligued to leave their homes because of political, economic or even religious circumstances.

On the other hand, migrations respond to need, but it is usually the consequence of another human rights violation: climate change, land grabbing, political persecution... something

that makes it impossible for them to live there.

At the end of the day, they are exactly the same.
