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
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
Front Page Picture:

There is no doubt that this experience of living a pandemic confinement does not happen every day. You have to go back a century to remember the pandemic of the misnamed "Spanish flu."

These has been a time in which, either you shrink, or on the contrary you come out reinforced.

A call to look inside. A call to contemplation, nature, a call to cultivate the senses. Looking inside in order to come outside reinforced. The situation, the moment, both personal as well as global, invites us to be connected through personal, community and world prayer.

I have remembered Mary Ward confined to her grandmother's house, confined because of her faith. She came out strengthened and with a mission to fulfill.

Those images, those morgues and those names, some of them you know, and they

are under the clutches of the covid 19.

The virtuality of the moment. We have been better assisted than ever. Networks, groups, theologians, and simple people have shared their experiences, their reflections, their day to day.

Mobile has brought us closer, and digital platforms have brought us together and we have seen, heard and felt.

I have lived it with a sense of globality and "feeling with the Church", as Ignatius de Loyola says in the Rules "Thinking with the Church" that he wrote while in Rome, between 1539 and 1541. Interesting to see that the original Spanish says "feeling", rather than "thinking"...

This became a reality when, on June 11, we had the closure of the activity of the Mary Ward Circles this year. We had a videoconference, and each group shared through a video, ppt, song, a text, their dreams for the future, their experience... This has also happened on Sundays when we met virtually at province level.

I want to rescue the image of Pope Francis, alone, in the Vatican Square.

"We are all in the same boat," the Pope told the world on March 27. A call to communion, to feel united and connected.

It is happening that many people are suffering from confinement myopia. We have not focused at long distance ... we have lost vision.

The mask takes away our expression, invites us to smile with our eyes. Social distance isolates us. Let's come closer from our hearts.

Now it's the time to focus at a long distance, to project and to dream that another world, with opportunities for all, is possible, thanks to equity, universal justice and human rights.

Hidden in each forest is a treasure that awaits us, a magic chest full of gifts placed there for each person, each thing... this is our life and this is simply wonderful. I wish that we pay attention not to get lost again in this forest of life that simply calls us to live as a human family:

- let us enter the forest of life with respect and love
- let us be conquered and amazed
- you don't have to run fast, you don't have to hurry, you have to look and feel.



One of the reflections that I have liked most of all is that of the <u>Chilean writer and</u> psychologist Pilar Sordo. She

defines anxiety and fear as an illness that she calls "an excess of future". This illness can affect us now, thinking so much about "what is going to happen now?" prevents us from connecting with the present, becoming aware of where we are and what we are doing, focusing on trust and gratitude instead of fear. Pilar Sordo makes a beautiful metaphor about love and fear that can make us think: "When we enter the room of love, we find the brothers of love: solidarity, justice, equaempathy, generosity, joy... When we enter the room of fear, we find the brothers of fear: selfishness, anger, envy, resentment, little empathy... it's up to each person to choose which room to enter to face the future.

Besides a couple of virtual meetings, we have had with the other groups of Mary Ward from Seville an end of course meeting, also virtual. It was precisely "What do we dream for the future" and in preparing it we had the opportunity, indeed, to dream. Our dreams are:

to live "from within" (prophetic motto of the IBVM schools for this past academic

year), not to lose the value of silence, to look with the eyes of God, so that people and situations that are important to Him do not pass unnoticed, to live more slowly, with time for all this, to pray more and to act better. And all for the greater glory of God.


- After this confinement, after so much looking inwards, with the breath of Pentecost, may we go out to a concrete action, to some mission...

Reflection for the Common House

On the occasion of the fifth anniversary of the publication of the Laudato Si', Catholics from all over the world joined together for a week of reflection, prayer and action for a better world, in which, as the encyclical on ecology says, "everything is connected".



I n 2015, the Pope wrote Laudato Si', helping the world's 1.2 billion Catholics to better understand that "everything is connected" and placing millennia of Catholic doctrine in the context of the current ecological crisis.

At the extraordinary moment of the fifth anniversary, the global mobilization that was planned to celebrate Laudato Si' week took place virtually, although it did not lose strength and participants.

Workshops and meetings were held online from all corners of the world, news, videos, Whatsapp messages were produced, inviting to and sharing reflections. Thousands of people from all over the world connected on May 24th to pray together online, each in their respective language, creating a wave of prayer for the Creation and for the most vulnerable in the world.

Many more initiatives filled a vibrant and energetic week, including the sharing of art, paintings, poetry, songs... Also, as part of the celebration, some really bold initiatives emerged, such as that of 42 religious institutions from 14 countries that announced their disinvestment in fossil fuels.

In addition, 21 Catholic organizations with \$40 billion in assets under their management pledged to invest in companies that are aligned with their values.

A wave of hope united Catholics around the world during Laudato Si Week, increasing the commitment to justice and solidarity, to the responsibility to act in defense of the earth and the life that inhabits it.

WIEE IN OUR SCHOOL


#IrlandesasFromHome, the year we in
