Day 1:

The Just Soul and Care for the Earth and Care for the Poor


The 'Just Soul' is a charism given to Mary Ward (1615) and the entire world. The vision of the Just Soul emphasizes:

- **Freedom:** free from attachments to earthly values and things, (use, not abuse of creation but care for all living things) for any kind of good works and to refer all to God.
- **Justice:** having right relationship with God, others, self, and the whole of creation.
- **Sincerity**: living a life of integrity and transparency without masks or pretense; "to be such as we appear and appear such as we are"; an openness that allows all creation to bring us to God.

Mary's sense that everything is interconnected is echoed in *Laudato Si*. The Just Soul calls for a new awareness that the earth is a place of abundance that God has provided for us. When we care for the earth, we are caring for the poor people and for the future. When the environment suffers people also suffer; for example, the Coronavirus disrupted life for so many of our brothers and sisters. The state as well as the individual has RESPONSIBILITY for future generations.

Day 2: Wise stewardship of the gift

Day 4: Animating others

"We can all collaborate as God's instruments for the care of creation, each one from his or her own culture, experience, initiatives and abilities". LS #14

We wish to take the wisdom of the original peoples of Latin America to help us find ways to care for and commit ourselves to creation.

In our Andean culture we ask permission from Pachamama to sow the earth, to interact with it. The term "Pachamama" is formed by two words of Quechua origin: "pacha" means world, time, universe and place, and "mama" means mother. Pachamama is the one who conceives life, the protective mother who protects, nourishes and sustains life, and for this reason she is honoured.

In the cosmovision of the Mayan peoples, there is a close relationship between the sacred earth and the human being. There is no distinction between the two, for all beings are part of the same living system called Our Mother Earth. Everything created possesses the breath of life that makes it worthy of the deepest respect.

The elders of our native peoples teach us that because of the destruction and plundering we have done to our mother earth we are in "no time". The way to return to sacred time, to *kairos*, is through respect and care for Mother Earth.

In my daily life, how can I ask permission from the earth when I sow it? How do I honour and respect creation? Am I willing to make a concrete and sustainable commitment to care for our common home? How?

Day 5: The gift of little

In Cuba, the encyclical Laudato Si is known more in the ecclesial environment, among priests and religious. It has not been popularized among the laity, and is more commented on in circles of those interested in environmental changes and the evolution of the global climate process.

The existence of a number of internal and external factors, which led to the deterioration of the economic situation of the country, among them: restrictions on import-export of products, limitation of private property, etc. led the population to resort to various creative processes, primarily not so much to protect the environment, but, above all, to manage to survive with little and face the challenges by using recyclable materials. Everything, in Cuba, can be recycled, everything serves a purpose: old car parts, broken household appliances, broken building materials, old medical instruments, extremely old clothes...all of these, through Cuban creativity, dictated by necessity and lack of commodities, are transformed into true works of art, able to last and serve for many years to come. Also, due to the fact that the necessary food is often not available, people have turned the land in front of their own households into fertile land for growing, mainly, vegetables.

We, the Sisters of Congregatio Jesu, motivated by the content of the encyclical, but especially by the example of the locals, have also resorted to the same process of fertilizing the land by: separating food waste, putting it in the ground and planting various vegetables, specific to this area. We also reuse anything that can be used in other circumstances: broken tree branches for burning when we don't have gas; leftover teaching materials, pieces of old carp; plastic bags.

We are grateful for all that we learn every day from our neighbors: that you can live and be happy with little!

Have a look around you and see what around you can be reused, recycled or given to those who are in greater need.

Day 6: Advocacy for Mother Earth

Genesis 1:31 'And God saw all that He had made, and behold, it was very good ...'.
