

Mary Ward Family JPIC Action Plan: Fair Trade

21 June 2023 marked the third anniversary of the launch of the Mary Ward Family 7 Year Action Plan. Many good things and exceptional actions have happened since then. We have approached each other and continued to respond to the Cry of the Earth and the Cry of the Poor, two of the goals of Laudato Si, in a variety of very creative and beautiful ways.

n the occasion of this anni-versary, the Mary Ward JPIC Office organised a very interesting webinar on Fair Trade. Fair Trade aims to alleviate poverty and promote sustainable development, but is it succeeding? The three speakers talked about the achievements and challenges of Fair Trade.

The first speaker was Joseph Blay, who spoke on "Mining and Fair Trade, a Ghanaian backdrop", focusing on gold mining in Ghana, the country where he lives, the largest gold producer in Africa and the sixth largest in the world. He began by explaining that

it would be hypocritical to say NO to any form of mining while we use technology such as mobile phones or computers, or fly in planes that need metals extracted from the earth through mining. Gold production in Ghana is mainly carried out by small-scale artisanal miners whose most fundamental rights are not respected. Father Blay denounced the modern slavery suffered by the exploited people in Ghana, and by the whole of society, as pollution from untreated gold mining waste poisons the water and the land, causing suffering to the whole of society, including the unborn, as many babies are born with malformations due to the effects of pollution on pregnant mothers. He called for gold production to be included in fair trade, so that its rules of respect for the dignity of people and the environment can help to improve life in Ghana.

We then had the opportunity to hear from Roopa Mehta, president of the World Fair Trade Organisation (WFTO). Fair Trade began in the 1960s and aims to explain that the lives of people and the planet must come before the accumulation of economic profit. It is a business model that has to take its rightful place in the new economy. For the WFTO it is a challenge, among many

others, to implement truly fair trade and to unmask these false models of production that reproduce exploitation centred on profits without taking care of human dignity or the planet.

Finally, the Franciscan Rodrigo de Castro Amédée, who lives and works in Brazil and has almost 40 years of experience working on land conflicts from the pastoral commission on land, among other responsibilities he is advisor to the Special Commission on Integral Ecology and member of the Board of Directors of the Churches and Mining Network. He spoke about resour-

ce extraction and fair trade from a Latin American perspective. The intensification of resource extraction, not only mining, but also the extraction of agricultural, fishing, oil and gas, etc. resources, stems from strategic policies adopted by countries or economic blocs that want to secure control of the world's raw materials.

Fair trade emerges as a potential solution to the negative impacts of mining and other extractions, however, the expansion of fair-trade products on the international market threatens to dilute the critique of the dominant economic model. Father De Castro

warned against the risk of fair trade becoming just another brand, losing its link to justice and solidarity. He also warned against the narratives of "green capitalism". One sign of these risks, he pointed out, is that the term Fair Trade has replaced the term Alternative Trade, diluting the need for alternative approaches to the dominant economic system, which prioritises profit over the lives of people and the planet.

Parliament of the World's Religions



he Parliament of the World's Religions met for the first time in Chicago in September 1893. In fact, it was a specific activity within the World Columbian Exposition, an early World Fair. The Parliament brought together representatives of virtually all the world's religions in a massive gathering. It was the first time in the history of humankind that a forum for dialogue and an attempt at understanding between the different faiths of the world was created.

The next Parliament was not convened until a century later, again in Chicago in 1993. Since then, it has been held several times and an infrastructure has been created to support the continuity of the work and the conclusions reached at each session of the Parliament.


The Parliament of the World's Religions aims to cultivate harmony among the world's religious and spiritual communities and to foster their engagement with the world and relevant institutions in order to achieve a just, peaceful, and sustainable world.

Since the meeting in Chicago (1993) the Parliament has been held in Cape Town (1999), Barcelona (2004), Melbourne (2009), Salt Lake City

(2015) and a Virtual Parliament (2021).

In addition to the main world religions, the Parliament meetings bring together religious groups that, under normal circumstances, would find it difficult to meet. At the meetings small or marginalised faith groups have the unique opportunity to educate others about their traditions in the respectful and compassionate atmosphere of an interfaith gathering.

In Chicago 1993, the elaboration of a Global Ethics was initiated. It was the theologian Hans Küng, who aroused great interest on a global scale of

this initiative. In the Declaration Towards a Global Ethic, a catalogue of universal ethical norms was formulated, based on the basic precepts of the great religions and non-religious ethical systems. Since 1993, working groups have been set up to monitor and develop this and other emerging issues at Parliament meetings, e.g., Climate Action, Peace and Justice, Women, Future Generations, Indigenous Peoples.

With "A Call to Conscience: Defending Freedom and Human Rights" as its theme, the Parliament of the World's Religions 2023 will be held in Chicago from 14 – 18 Aug. In light of the present and growing

authoritarianism in our world today, this Parliament "will be the largest and most important gathering of the world's religious and spiritual leaders and practitioners, coming together in a collective, courageous and clear response to this most dangerous crisis facing us today."

A group from the Mary Ward Family will be in Chicago. I am privileged to be part of our delegation and know it is going to be a meaningful experience at this time. We will share the conclusions and the tasks ahead with the international Mary Ward Family.


