he Parliament of the World's Religions, held in Chicago from 14–18 August 2023, was an interfaith event that brought together more than 7,000 participants from 95 countries and 210



faith traditions. This gathering stood out as a global platform for dialogue and community integration, focusing on crucial issues such as freedom, human rights, climate change and biodiversity.

The Mary Ward Family participated in this important

event, besides attending and contributing to the various workshops and meetings, by organising an intergenerational workshop, in collaboration with the IBVM/CJ Network Office at the UN. This workshop, led by young women, addressed crucial issues such as mental health, climate change and threats to democracy.

The event highlighted humanity's collective awakening to responsibility as inhabitants of planet Earth. The need to revitalise sacred teachings and rituals in a contemporary context was emphasised. Religious leaders, business leaders and political activists shared concrete examples of this awakening of consciousness. In addition, crucial issues related to women and religion, from extreme manifestations of oppression to latent subtleties, were addressed in a dedicated plenary and various thematic workshops.

Climate change and biodiversity were at the centre of the discussions, with over 80 workshops and numerous initiatives from various faith streams to mitigate and adapt to these circumstances. The active involvement of the faith community in these critical issues was a powerful testimony to their commitment to a sustainable future.

The Mary Ward Family's participation in the Parliament of the World's Religions was a testament to meaningful and hopeful interfaith work. Their contribution to the intergenerational workshop and their active presence in discussions on human rights, climate change and women's empowerment were tangible examples of their commitment to a more hopeful interfaith future. Although this session of the Parliament has concluded, the commitment of the Mary Ward family and other participants to interfaith work persists and continues, marking a path towards a more comprehensive and unified global future leaving no one behind.

Exchanging Smiles

The Congregation of Jesus, through the school in Badalona, has a beautiful intergenerational project in the Sant Antoni de Llefià neighbourhood. The students of the school interact with the elderly of the two residences in the neighbourhood. Everyone learns and enjoys exchanging smiles.



aria Ward School in Badalona is located in the middle of the Sant Antoni de Llefià neighbourhood. One of the characteristics that most defines us is our continuous social action. Within this framework, the school decided to start an intergenerational project called "Intercambiamos Sonrisas". This project is based on collaboration with the two elderly people's homes in our neighbourhood: the Domènech i Montaner home and the Badalona home.

This initiative, carried out from Infant Education to ESO, is based on a series of activities proposed to brighten up the stay of our grandparents in the residences. Some of these activities are: the exchange of handicrafts, which aim to decorate their rooms and common rooms; the singing of the choir, which encourages them to remember some traditional songs; the solidarity Olympics, which encourages the elderly to play bowling and ring toss; the joint creation of wooden houses, so that the little birds in their yard can nest, or the toque toca, which helps them to keep their fine psychomotor





skills awake.

The older students of our school also collaborate with the grandparents in a very active way by playing traditional games such as dominoes, cards or memory games.

The project tries to enhance the sensitivity of our students towards the elderly in order to provoke some smiles among them. This was the inspiration for the title of our project "Intercambiamos Sonrisas" and it has been our milestone for the last two years. In mid-October, Caritas Diocesana, in its "Escolas amb Cor" programme, asked the Pastoral Coordinator, Pili Fernández, to present this project to the rest of the schools in Catalonia, which are or aspire to be recognised as "Escola amb Cor". The idea was to offer new possibilities and examples of how to help children grow in solidarity, opening their eyes to discover the needs of the people around us and, in this case, the possibilities and enrichment of meeting with the elderly.

The pupils enjoy participating and receiving the grandparents' handicrafts, letters and tokens of affection. All this is displayed in a corner of the school.

n 26th October 2023 a dream that the Mary Ward family of Castilleja de la Cuesta had been dreaming of for a long time came true, to have Mary Ward's name on their streets.s.

The idea of naming a street after Mary Ward in Castilleja de la Cuesta had been on the minds of the Aljarafe school community, staff and former pupils of the school for a long time. The Mayoress, Carmen Herrera, said on the 26th that she thought it was an excellent idea to pay tribute to so many years of IBVM presence and work for the education of generations of Castilleja's residents, but that it had been difficult to find a suitable space.

Indeed, several times a street was suggested, but the Asso-

ciation of Former Students of Seville, including those from Castilleja de la Cuesta, and the school community and staff did not consider it appropriate because the streets were far from the school. Finally, last year, the Town Hall put in work to improve Calle Diego de los Reyes, just behind the school. In this improvement work, the street was widened with a Paseo and this extension attracted the attention of the Mary Ward family mentioned above. The town council registered the formal request for this nomination last year, and from the outset it seemed to everyone the perfect opportunity to pay the desired tribute.

The event was beautiful and fun. As it could not be otherwise, a tribute to an English woman, it was full of the so English uninterrupted rain. There was also no lack of joy, which Mary Ward loves so much. Thanks to the colourful umbrellas, all the smiles at the meeting and all the laughter that escaped from the downpour, we had a truly unforgettable afternoon. The Institute is very grateful to

Information was given on the work to be carried out in the different areas and various legal developments affecting the life of the schools were also discussed.

During these days there was also time for prayer, Eucharist and fellowship, which allowed us to share moments of great depth and emotion.

From this meeting, it is up to the Management Teams to transfer and share in their schools these moments of formation, joy and enthusiasm. In this way, we will be able to define together from each reality how to continue building the common Educational Project of the Educational Foundation, taking into account the diversity and richness of each of our schools.

Undoubtedly, it has been a great step forward in the construction of the Mary Ward Educational Foundation, thus responding to the objective of the meeting. All this will allow us to **continue walking together towards this common horizon**.
